LESSON THREE: MAKE MOVES!

Activity Overview:

This activity combines physical exercise with learning about geography and the UEFA EURO 2024. Students will create a scale model of the tournament's stadium locations in the gym using cones or markers.

Setup:

Children will work in pairs, choosing a football team participating in EURO 2024. They will simulate the team's journey across the map, visiting stadiums in the order of their matches.

Movement Component:

Travel between stadiums involves various movements like walking, running, or pretending to ride a train.

Each pair can then collect a football and dribble between each venue. Roles switch at each stadium, alternating between 'navigator', who leads the way, and 'ball manager', who dribbles the ball.

Pairs can then pass a ball to each other, using either hands or feet, as they move from one stadium to the next.
